



EDITORIAL

We always start the year with such great hope and a little apprehension but no-one imagined that 2022 would bring a most terrible war affecting Europe and, with the arrival of Spring, we will also see the arrival of refugees coming to our country to find safety.

In Ukraine, Orthodox Christians celebrate Easter later than we do, still using the Julian calendar to fix the date. Like us, they follow the tradition of reflection and fasting during 40 days of Lent, followed by Easter itself, when church bells ring out to celebrate the Resurrection of Christ, the fasting is over and special foods are served. Whilst Easter Sunday for us will fall on 17th April this year, under the Julian calendar Easter in the Orthodox church will be a week later, on 24th April.

For Ukrainian children, Easter Sunday means playing a game with hard boiled eggs dyed with the beetroot or onion skin,tapping each other's eggs in an egg fight like a gentler form of conkers. A player whose egg-shell is cracked is out of the game. Tragically, the painted eggs of Easter symbolise protection from evil and harm. If only the war could be over by then but somehow eggs are not going to be enough to fend off this evil.

Whilst on the subject of food, one of the perks of helping to put together the magazine is getting a sneaky preview of the recipe of the month, and the April recipe for Bloody Mary sausage casserole from Kevin Compton just looked too good not to try. However, we would like to offer a tip for anyone who wants to give it a go, as three tablespoons of vodka are needed. Any vodka will work but please don't use Russian Standard. Polish vodka is far more suitable.

FROM CHURCH COTTAGE

As I write this, the news from Ukraine is truly dire. If you are the praying sort, please keep the brave people of that country in your prayers. We have witnessed truly shocking images of Putin's atrocities and heart-breaking scenes of bewildered refugees fleeing their country. It is hard to find words ade-



quately to express our outrage with the aggressor. We weep, and stand in solidarity with the victims of this humanitarian disaster, and you will soon see the Ukrainian flag on the Duncton Church mast.

There have already been amazing responses in our villages, with fundraising events for humanitarian organisations and medics operating in Ukraine, plus wonderful initiatives to pack boxes and vehicles with clothes, blankets, food and toiletries. If you have signed up to offer accommodation to refugees via the government-led Homes for Ukraine scheme, thank you very much indeed.

For Christians, in the season of Lent we are called to orientate ourselves towards God and to confess the failings of humanity. Prayer is the starting point, but as churches we can help practically, too. I have registered each of my churches with the Sanctuary Foundation, and, in doing so, our congregations pledge, alongside thousands of non-churchgoers, to be Community Sponsors for any Ukrainian refugees who settle in or near our parishes. We will meet and greet at the airport, offer transport, meals and friendship. And we will help refugees to access services, working alongside our parish councils and other agencies. Wonderful and historic as our buildings are, 'the church' is the people, not the building. We are called by Jesus to live out the Gospel in our practical action, showing love for our neighbours.

Rising prices and the spectre of fuel poverty are hitting many people hard. Quite apart from the current frightening price of heating oil – petrol and diesel, too – supplies are limited. The message I want to send, as your parish priest, is, if you are struggling in any way, please 'just ask' . . . please contact me, with the assurance of strict confidentiality. The difficult circumstances of individuals and families may make them eligible for support from charities with which I am connected, including the Petworth Food Bank and the Tillington Fuel Poverty Hardship Fund.

The world approaches this Easter on its knees and in darkness. God will redeem the world, because that is what God has done, time and again throughout history, and will do so again. There are lots of opportunities to come to a service this April, including on Easter Day. Please do.

I hope that you can enjoy some time with your families this Easter.

The national plan for celebrations will include:-

Thousands of town criers, along with Pearly Kings and Queens, bag-pipers and Northumberland pipers, buglers and choirs from communities the four corners of the nation and the Commonwealth will lift up their voices and play and sing specially commissioned music prior to the lighting of over 1,500 Platinum Jubilee Beacons, at 9.45pm on Thursday 2nd June.

At **9.35pm** local time across the UK and Commonwealth, traditional bagpipers and Northumbrian pipers and pipe bands will play *Diu Regnare*, a unique tune specially written for the occasion by Pipe Major, Stuart Liddell, the world's leading piper.

At **9.40pm** buglers linked to local beacon lightings across the UK and the capital cities of the Commonwealth, will officially announce the lighting of the beacons with a specially written bugle call, entitled *Majesty*.

Then at **9.45pm** exactly local time, and to coincide with the lighting of the beacons, community choirs across all nations will sing *Song for the Commonwealth*, which has been written and composed by Lucy Keily, from Australia, and Vincent Atueyi Chinemelu from Nigeria.

THE DAY KING GEORGE VI DIED.

My RAF father was stationed in Aden between 1951 and 1953. It was then a wonderful peaceful location. His role was to supervise all flying operations. By coincidence, his best man, another Group Captain, had a similar job in Nairobi in Kenya. A two week holiday was planned there in February 1952.

My mother and I, along with a number of other passengers, were being flown by my father from Aden to Nairobi when it was announced that King George had died. We landed half way there at the tiny airstrip at Hargeisa in Somaliland in order to refuel only to discover that the few ground staff (fortunately with one exception) had travelled into Hargeisa in order to mourn the King's death. They had taken the keys to the petrol storage area with them!

We found a sleeping Arab who volunteered to run into town (seven miles) in order to collect the keys which he duly did. All the passengers then had to help refuel the plane, a Vickers Viking, by hand and it took a long time. Fortunately, as a seven year old child, I was told to watch.

Whilst observing everyone else working, I discovered another resident, a small tortoise who was instantly befriended. When we were eventually ready to take off, it was agreed that my tortoise could come too, to be given to the son of Dad's friend. The flight was very bumpy and the poor tortoise was soon sliding backwards and forwards along the cabin floor with its legs totally unable to find any grip. I am sure that it was relieved to be handed over to safer hands. Apart from going on wonderful safaris, my parents were able to play golf at the Muthaiga Club. I dutifully followed them around and was amazed to see how attentive the caddies were. Once the players had teed off, they ran after the ball and, having found it, used their feet in order to tee the ball on the fairway or in the rough. Great service.

The Muthaiga Club had a swimming pool into which I plunged without a second thought. However I got out ASAP and did not return. The water was freezing. Nairobi was warm and sunny but was situated at nearly 6,000 feet whereas I had been used to being at sea level in a very hot and humid climate approaching 100 Fahrenheit!

Sadly, we never met the new Queen.

SHIPMENTS TO UKRAINE DISASTER EMERGENCY COMMITTEE (DEC)

The situation in Ukraine is heartbreaking and is moving people more than ever to donate cash and supplies. Sadly, the situation globally tells an even more devastating story. 2021 saw 84 million people displaced from their homes, 27 million as refugees, a record-breaking number even before the additional 3 million Ukrainians, who have crossed into neighbouring countries in the last 3 weeks.

The international humanitarian agencies' response to Ukraine has been the biggest since the 2010 Haiti earthquake, and organizations such as World Vision were on the border with Romania within 24 hours providing shelter, food, psychosocial support and working to protect children and stop trafficking of women and children.

The DEC appeal which brings together 15 charities has already raised GBP175 million for Ukraine and this is making a real difference to the way we respond right now.

But there is a desire to do more. Across the country, collections of clothes, toys and bedding have been taking place to ship to Ukraine. I have been working in humanitarian aid and development across the world for 30 years, and, while we know the donations are well meant, the reality on the ground is that we do not have the ware house space, transportation, sorting or distribution capacity to manage this response. And sadly, so much of what is sent, is actually not needed, is not appropriate or not safe for distribution.

I was immediately reminded of the Kosovo response in 1999, where there was a similar mobilization of material from across Europe. The truth was that we spent years and a fortune disposing of the items that were sent, not to mention the ship full of eggs sent in the heat of summer, when eggs started exploding!

But there are very practical and needed ways to help with donations:

- So far 44,000 places for Ukrainian refugees have been offered up in UK. They will need clothes, household items etc., so please still collect but distribute in the UK. Sancturayfoundation.org.uk can help you match donation with need.
- 12,000 Afghan refugees are still stuck in hotels and hostels in the UK waiting to be rehoused and are desperately in need of basic items. Contact afghanwelcome.org
- If you are a company or have access to new items, contact one of the 15 DEC charities to see what items we are actually looking for and can effectively distribute.

Thank you for everything you are doing for the response in Ukraine, along with those in Syria, Yemen, Afghanistan, Iraq, Lebanon to name just a few on Europe's doorstep, all desperately needing your financial support to enable children to survive, thrive and reach their God given potential.

SUSSEX WILD LIFE—by Michael Blencowe: Common Pipistrelle

I spend way too much time in graveyards (especially considering that I'm going to spend an awful lot of time in one in the future). But they are great places to look for Pipistrelle bats. At this time of year, adult Pipistrelles are emerging from their winter hibernation and taking flight. Above Sussex, the night sky is a battlefield of deafening cries as Pipistrelles swoop and swirl, plummet and pounce at their insect prey.

The acrobatic anarchy overhead goes unnoticed by us humans. Our hearing is limited and when it comes to night vision we're as blind as, well, something with really bad eyesight ...in fact anything but a bat. Bats have excellent vision. But it certainly isn't their best sense.

Echolocation is one of the animal world's most incredible superpowers. A Pipistrelle shouts, the shout hits something and bounces back. This echo is instantly analysed in an amazing brain and tells the bat how far away the object is and whether it's a mosquito, a moth or a mansion. To get the maximum information from their echo, Pipistrelles yell at high frequencies (45 kHz; we can only hear up 20 kHz). And these shouts are loud; pneumatic drill or jet fighter loud. Up to 110 decibels in some species. A bat would deafen itself if it heard its own shout. So Pipistrelles have to disengage their ears, then shout, then turn their hearing back on, listen for the echo, analyse, then start all over again. All at the rate of 10-15 times a second. This gives bats an amazing, multi-layered awareness of their surroundings. But it's tricky (and impolite) to shout when you're eating, so once a moth is in the mouth the bat has to chew-shout-listenchew-shout-listen to avoid a collision.

There are 17 different species of bat in Sussex. Our smallest – the Common Pipistrelle – is also the one you're most likely to see around your gardens. Back in the 80's there were just four TV channels, two types of videocassette and one species of Pipistrelle in Britain. But in the 90's, scientists discovered that some Pipistrelles were echolocating at higher frequencies (55 kHz) a Montserrat Caballé to the Common Pipistrelle's Freddie Mercury. These are the Soprano Pipistrelles. There's now a third: Nathusius' Pipistrelle. By affixing lightweight metal rings to this species' wings, researchers have discovered that these bats are migrating to Sussex from as far away as Latvia. An amazing journey for an amazing animal.

UPPERTON CART SHED

Dear Parishioner

Tucked away in Upperton there is an old timber structure that served originally as a cart shed and subsequently as a grain store. The shed was offered to and purchased by the Parish Council from Leconfield Estate in 1976 for a nominal £100 and is integral to the historic structure and amenity of Upperton. It has for many years been a space for modern day carts to park. The Parish Council's objective is to secure the structural integrity of the cart shed for decades to come so that it continues to be both practically useful and a valued structure. Whilst it is currently safe to use the time has come to ensure its structural integrity before there is a critical failure.

In 2019 the Parish Council was sufficiently concerned about the structural integrity of the cart shed to temporarily suspend access. Having commissioned a full survey we were satisfied that the structure was safe to resume its use as car parking.

The structure is Grade II listed so the surveys included a schedule of essential repairs so that a planning application could be submitted to carry them out and so secure the structural integrity for many years to come. Permission was granted in May 2019 and these works need to be started before May 2022. If anyone would like to see the survey and elevation drawings they are most welcome and we will be uploading them to the website along with the schedule of works.

With Covid dominating our lives for the last two years, the Parish Council has now obtained a cost schedule for these repairs at just over £23,000 + VAT. The reason for the high cost is that to effect a long lasting repair the roof tiles really need to be taken off to get at the structure beneath. The work would be supervised and coordinated by Ben Kirk who is a very well respected local timber structure expert and who carried out the initial survey. We are all ready to go and the Parish Council has committed £7500 of its 22/23 budget towards this substantial cost. There are very limited opportunities to source funding to cover the shortfall and so we are reaching out to you to help us meet this cost and secure this structure for generations to come!

APPS AND MODERN DAY MOBILE HACKS

What does "Apps" stand for, what does it mean, what is an "app"? Aptitude, application, appliance. I don't know what it is really short for but it is definitely short for something. I google it and find that APP is an acronym which could have any of 130 definitions. Here are a few:

Approved, appendix application, approach, apparently Asbuy Park Press, appointments, apparatus, Appalachian, appropriation, Atom Publishing Protocol, Aluminium Precision Products, Amyloid Precursor Protein, Associated Press of Pakistan, etc. etc..

An app on your smart phone is an application that enables you to do or to discover almost anything from identifying a plant or tree to finding a holiday, to tracking an aeroplane or playing games. There will be an app for just about anything you can think of. You will have on your smart phone an APP which will be labelled app store or something similar. Many apps are free and many charge; prices vary from a one-off charge to a monthly/annual fee.

There are several ways you can use your smart phone apps to save your life as well as those of others. Another app, one of the best, is simply called what3words and enables you never to get lost. The developers of the app divided the world into 3 meter squares and allotted three different words for each 3meter square. For example, where I am sitting writing this, is dissolves.ambushed.swaps. The app also tells me the Horse Guards is herb.movements.poem and is 21 metres south of me. (I did actually know that!) If I go for a walk and check the app to note the 3 words where I have left my car, I can walk away safe in the knowledge that I can always find my way back.

Another lifesaving way to use your phone, in particular an Apple phone, is to use the emergency feature. If you find an Apple phone, and I am sure Android will have the same, simply press the phone as if you were turning it on and at the bottom on will the the left. have "emergency". Press this. From here you can either dial 999 or again at the bottom left are the words, "Medical Inf.". Press this and, if the owner has filled it in, it will give you the name of the owner and a contact phone number.

Lastly, if you think you might be needing help and your phone is running out of battery or, if the phone has a poor intermittent signal, change your answering machine message and either give the what3words position of where you are or simply say that you are in need of help and your location.

TALK OF WAR AT TILLINGTON BREAKFAST

The speaker on this occasion was popular political broadcaster, Tom Newton Dunn. Not so long ago, Tom might have prepared to come here and give a light-hearted view of the current political scene but the gravity of the current situation in Ukraine dictated the subject of the breakfast talk and those who attended were therefore given the benefit of his considerable knowledge as someone who has held the roles of defence correspondent and political editor on major national newspapers before becoming a political commentator on Times Radio.



Tom gave us insight into the possible course of the war, the impenetrable nature of the Kremlin and the likely effects of the sanctions which are being placed on Russia. He talked of NATO's thinking and likely direction, and gave his views on the geopolitical alignments we can expect to see in future decades. There was also an interesting insight into the character of our Prime Minister, who Tom knew in his early working life at the Daily Telegraph as well as the BBC's fearless reporter Clive Myrie whom Tom spent time with in the Middle East.

The floor then was given over to questions and comment, which included Putin's health, the possibility of readiness in the manner of the Cuban Missile Crisis and, from a fellow journalist and previous breakfast speaker, where do the good people of Tillington go for factual news reporting, as opposed to commentary?

Tom finished with two predictions regarding the politics of the UK: one for the short term and one for the next general election. He has said he hopes to be invited again as a Tillington breakfast speaker. This will be one not to be missed. And we will by then know at least whether his short-term predictions were correct!

EASTER AND THE GOOD FRIDAY STORY – The supporting cast who influenced history

Throughout the Christian world the Easter story is extremely well known and has been retold annually for over 2000 years. Jesus' betrayal after the Last Supper. His denunciation by Annas and his son-in-law, the Jewish high priest, Caiaphas. His trial and condemnation to death by the Roman governor Pontius Pilate. His flogging and Crucifixion. His Cross being carried by Simon of Cyrene. His death being checked by the Roman centurion, by piercing his side with a spear. His body being taken down by Joseph of Arimathea. The body being anointed and wrapped by Joseph and Nicodemus before being buried in a tomb. This, all followed by the great Christian message of Resurrection when Jesus rose from the dead and was seen again on the third day, Easter Day.

But who were the bit-players in the supporting cast whose decisions at the time influenced the whole history of the Christian era? Who were Annas, Caiaphas, Pilate, Simon of Cyrene, the centurion (Longinus), Joseph and Nicodemus?

Annas. In AD 6 the Romans put Judaea under direct Roman rule by deposing the leader (Ethnarch), Archelaus. The Roman legate appointed Annas as the first High Priest of this newly formed Roman province. He served for ten years (AD 6-15). At the age of 36 he was deposed but remained highly influential in Jewish and political issues, aided by the fact that his five sons all served as High Priests as did his daughter's husband Caiaphas. It is thought that he died about AD 40. It is possible that he was still President of the Jewish Sanhedrin (Council) when Jesus was brought to trial. The influential members of the Sanhedrin were unsettled by the influence and massive following of Jesus, and they took the opportunity to condemn him for not denying that he was the Son of God. When Jesus was arrested by a detachment of soldiers and Jewish officials he was taken first to Annas, who passed him on to his son-in-law Caiaphas as the current High Priest.

Caiaphas. He came from the priestly division of Ma'aziah, instituted by king David. He was made high priest by Gratus, the 4th Roman Governor of Judaea, probably a good decision for the Romans as he served them in 'harmony' for eighteen years. When Pontius Pilate gave Jesus back to the Sanhedrin for sentencing he said 'Here is your king'. Caiaphas the High Priest obsequiously replied 'We have no king but Caesar'. After this Pilate handed Jesus over to them to be crucified. How differently things might have been if the whole Sanhedrin had been asked, as we know that two very wealthy and significant members, Joseph of Arimathea and Nicodemus, were already followers of Jesus.

Pontius Pilate. He was the 5th Roman Governor of Judaea, succeeding Gratus, and appointed by the Emperor Tiberius. It was a aatop posting for one of his social class (rich but not aristocratic) and he commanded a legion, necessary because the Jews repeatedly rebelled. His training taught him, @keep the perovince peaceful above all else'. Pilate was married to a bright and in-

sightful wife. It was she who had a dream warnin,g Pilate at Jesus' trial "Don't have anything to do with this innocent man". How different things might have been if he had listened! Pilate found Jesus innocent, but in his weakness, submitted to the Jewish leaders demands for crucifixion, in the interests of his own future and local peace. Legend says that Pilate was executed or committed suicide in AD 39 on the orders of the Emperor Caligula. If so, his body was thrown into the Tiber river.

Simon of Cyrene. He is named as the man summoned from the crowd by the soldiers on the way to the crucifixion to carry the Cross for Jesus. He came from Cyrene a small town sited on the Mediterranean coast in modern day Libya. He may have been a dark skinned native or a Jewish settler. The bible names his two sons as Rufus and Alexander. It is said that after the Crucifixion he went to preach the gospel in Egypt.

Normally the condemned man was forced to carry his own cross. Perhaps Jesus, having been brutally flogged, was so near to dying that the soldiers intervened? How different things might have been.

The Centurion (Longinus). Attributed the name Longinus possibly due to the length of his spear, he belonged to the Roman Empire's elite forces trained to supress uprisings. In charge of Jesus' crucifixion, he witnessed the death and confirmed it by thrusting his spear into Jesus' side, rather than following the usual procedure of breaking the legs. He was awestruck at seeing the earth shake and the rocks split, and darkness descend. He exclaimed "Surely he was the Son of God". The rest of his life after baptism he became a follower of Christ and witnessed to others. How different things might have been.

Joseph of Arimathea and Nicodemus. Joseph came from the Judean town of Arimathea. He was a wealthy member of the 70 strong Sanhedrin, the Jewish Council. A dealer in metal goods he was a secret disciple of Jesus. He risked his reputation and his life by standing up for Jesus. He privately requested of Pilate that he might take Jesus' body from the Cross and bury it in a tomb on his own land. In this he was assisted by another wealthy member of the Sanhedrin, Nicodemus, who had previously secretly visited Jesus at night. He brought 75 pounds weight of myrrh and aloes to anoint the body, before wrapping it in cloth strips. Together they confirmed the death and rolled a heavy boulder to close the tomb on that fateful Friday night.

The following Sunday morning Mary Magdalene and Mary the mother of Jesus visited the tomb and were the first witnesses of the miraculous resurrection of Jesus Christ. The very first Easter Day, but how different it all might have been!

These stories are well documented in the first four books of the New Testament in the Bible.



DUNCTON HILL WOODS

Fountain Copse: Safety Work and Replanting

The mature ash trees in Fountain Copse were severely infected with both ash dieback and honey fungus when we took the decision to fell them last summer.

BARLAVINGTON

With rights of way running along two sides of the wood, the risk from mature trees disintegrating was significant and our plan to fell and restore the woodland was put in place, following guidance from the Health and Safety Executive and licensing from the Forestry Commission, and with grant help from DEFRA.

Because of wood decay, the felled timber only produced a small number of ash saw logs, the majority of the felled material going for firewood. Residual branches and crown wood ("lop and top") were chipped in situ and sent to a power station in Kent for electricity generation.

To protect the regeneration area we have deer-fenced the site, using chestnut posts from Petworth as being the most durable, and from a local and sustainable source. The deer fence looks unsightly, but without it the trees will not survive: high deer numbers are now the single biggest threat to our woodlands (so eat more venison!). Last summer we left as many standing mature trees as we dared, including some fine wild cherry, and the fence will allow natural regeneration of trees from the existing seedbed and from regrowth of coppice. In this way we hope for regeneration of disease resistant ash trees to complement the planted trees.

Planting has included a mixture of broadleaved trees that are well adapted to the site, which are found growing locally, which can produce useful material in the future and which hopefully will be resilient in a changing climate. The first phase of planting has included black walnut, cherry, oak, and hornbeam. We have also included an experimental number of tulip trees. Tulip tree is a decorative garden tree in the UK; there's one in the gardens of Duncton Mill House, so we are confident it will grow well here. In its native home in the United States however it is an important timber crop, and tulip tree honey is also a commercial product there, so maybe our bees in the orchard next door will like it?

We have a little more work to do at Fountain Copse but as soon as the heavy machinery has stopped driving about we'll repair the paths.

It will take about five years for the young trees to get established, and a decade before we start to thin out the stand and select the best trees to grow on. Ash dieback is having a devastating impact on woodlands in Sussex as we

Ash dieback is having a devastating impact on woodlands in Sussex as we can see all around us, and we must sadly be prepared for all our woods and trees to suffer as the climate changes too. By taking a proactive and thoughtful approach we are trying to regenerate areas of collapsing ash and continue to take care of our woods with resistant species that will be the woodlands of the future.

SAMARA'S AID DIGNITY BAGS

In Syria, a lot of wealthy, skilled and able-bodied people left the country during the war which changed the mographics. The war left many widows and orphans and currently these poor people are struggling to pay for the cost of cooking oil and wheat, which have soared in price. Samara has set up a centre for widows and orphans where they provide a meal for those who are struggling. A lot of these people are living in appalling conditions in buildings damaged by the war.

Samara was very moved, on a recent visit to Syria, by seeing so many children wearing summer flip flops in the snow and noticing how their feet were cracked by the cold. This led to her setting up the dignity bags



appeal to try to provide for about 350 orphans from 3 to 18 in age. On appealing for folk in our 5 parishes to collect these basic items like soap, toothpaste, shampoo bars, combs, pants and socks, I was amazed at the generous response of money and items donated. This enabled us to buy some coats and shoes to pack into the reusable bags which were purchased as part of the gift to each child.

Louise Exall, Sue Thomas and I, managed to pack up 21 dignity bags for various aged children. These were loaded into banana boxes and delivered to Samara at a collection hub in Brighton along with £100 and 2 bags of assorted bits we had left over. It is so important that we don't forget countries like Syria and Afghanistan with the terrible war in Ukraine which is so consuming our thoughts at the moment. SUSTAINABLE FASHION

Sustainability is the current "IN" term, peppering articles, policy making, and marketing campaigns everywhere. We consumers find it hard to discern the good from the bad data. Nowhere is this more obvious than in the fashion industry.

Declared the third most polluting and environmentally destructive industry in the world it is responsible for up to 10% of global carbon emissions, to put this into perspective that is more than all international flights and maritime shipping combined!

But just how is the fashion industry having this impact?

Firstly, it is an intensely **extractive** industry requiring significant resources for both the garment's raw materials and textile processes like bleaching and dyeing. It is estimated that a single cotton T-shirt requires 2700 litres of water – the same amount a human would drink in 3 years! Moreover, after production, washing clothes using washing machines is estimated to use 20 billion cubic metres of water a year! Such an intense use of water resources contributes to issues of water scarcity around the globe.

A second key sustainability issue is waste production.

The fashion industry is incredibly polluting which comes in many forms. Textile companies discharge millions of gallons of chemically contaminated water, (a by-product of garment treatment and dyeing) into waterways causing both environmental damage and disease, most often in developing communities. Furthermore, 60% of all materials used by the fashion industry are made from plastics which, when washed, breakdown into microplastics that get released into the ocean and threaten aquatic life. These items are also slow to biodegrade. When discarded, some synthetic fabrics take up to 200 years to break down – producing the greenhouse gas methane as they do so.

These negative environmental impacts are worsening as a direct result of the 'fast fashion trend' (the clothing industry's current business model of replicating catwalk trends and high-fashion designs and mass-producing them at low cost). In addition, fast fashion also has a significant human cost as textile workers, primarily women in developing countries, are often paid derisory wages, and forced to work long hours in appalling conditions.

Thus far the picture seems pretty bleak, but importantly not all brands participate in these destructive processes, whilst very common they are not universal. Also, thanks to a combination of heightened consumer awareness and regulation, things are improving. Brands are increasingly keen to address and reduce their environmental impact and should be encouraged by governing powers to do so.

But the question I always ask is what I can do myself as a consumer to try and have a sustainable wardrobe? Here are three tips:

Research -Try to buy from brands that operate with a sustainable focus in mind. The website https://goodonyou.eco/ is a great place to start as they rate popular brands on their social and environmental impact!

Thrift it – Buying clothes second hand from vintage or charity shops is a great way to not only save garments from landfill but also reducing the demand for new clothes to be made. Donating your old clothes is also a great way to be sustainable


Wash less – by washing clothes less you are reducing the water wastage and potential microplastic outflow whilst also protecting the garment from wear thus making it last longer!

EVENSONG WITH THE ARCHBISHOP OF CANTERBURY

The Archbishop of Canterbury visited Chichester Diocese over the first weekend in March, culminating in an Evensong on Sunday afternoon in Chichester Cathedral.

I was lucky enough to be invited as part of an initiative to engage the business community in Bishop Martin's Community Outreach Project, and Louise Hartley was able to join me. The basis of the Community Outreach Project, which includes a resilience project, an environmental project, building a legacy for our communities, refugee hospitality project and a governance and sustainability project, is for the Church to engage with communities and discover ways of working together to enable both to grow and flourish.

The Cathedral was packed and we were shown to a seat above the choir stalls — which turned out to be a really good position sandwiched between the 3 Diocesan Bishops (Bishop Martin opposite us in his magnificent wooden throne; Bishop Ruth and Bishop Will next to us) and the Archbishop of Canterbury the other side by the altar.

The Archbishop preached well, holding our attention throughout. He told us about some of the things he had done that weekend including standing on a soapbox preaching in Lewes, and taking communion in Ford open prison. He reminisced about how he had visited Chichester Cathedral just before he was made Archbishop of Canterbury, and whilst walking around the Cathedral in plain black robes a man had asked him if he was a member of the clergy. When he said that he was, the man told him that he had heard that the Archbishop of Canterbury was coming to the Cathedral and could he be introduced to him. When the Archbishop explained that in fact he was the Archbishop of Canterbury, the man just said 'Oh' and walked off. Clearly he wasn't what the man expected. What I hadn't expected was the Archbishop's very good sense of humour.

The service, a sung Evensong, was excellent. The choir sang beautifully, crystal clear and of one melodic voice – the best singing I have heard in a long time. The pomp and ceremony were perfect too. It was fascinating to see the readers of the Gospel and the Collect being collected by a man with a staff who led them to the pulpit at the right time.

It was a huge privilege to have attended the service, and we were able to put in a good word for David with Bishop Martin afterwards!

- 3 Garlic Cloves, bashed
- 2 Bay Leaves
- 1 chicken Stock Pot (Knorr)
- 400g Tin Flageolet Beans (do not drain)

Parsley to Serve

Method

Heat oven to 180°C or Gas 4.

Brown sausages and bacon in oil.

Remove sausages and bacon from frying pan and leave to one side. Add onions and celery to the frying pan and cook for 8 minutes. Stir in the balsamic glaze. Season with salt and pepper.

Add everything to a casserole pot and cook for 35-40 minutes or until rich and sticky.

Serve with buttery mashed potato.

GARDEN NOTES

What a wonderful time of the year to have a garden and let's make the most of it. Apparently the cost of fertilisers for the commercial growers means there will be fewer vegetables in the shops. So let's get planting. If you have a greenhouse, start sowing seeds at the end of this month so by May they will be mature enough to be put outside. If you use windowsills wait until April when the light levels are better. However, plugs are easier to bring on.

Beans, tomatoes, brassicas, sweet peas, cosmos, etc. are too tempting for the slugs if they are sown straight into the soil especially now that slugs are considered to be 'garden visitors' by the RHS, pellets I fear we must not use, so let's make the plants too tough for them! (Perhaps the answer is to make a small pond, hope the toads will eat the slugs). I bend lengths of wire netting over the young plants against the hungry pigeons, the wire can be supported on sticks as the plants grow. Keep planting garlic, and shallots every few weeks. I have been told Rosaka or Apero are good baby plum tomatoes and Sakura good cherry tomatoes.

With summers that have become so dry, here are some recommended shrubs that once established are very successful. *Abelia*, semi evergreen with arching stems and small pink flowers, and **Buddleia** *davidii*, 'Profusion' and 'Royal Red', both these shrubs are for the back of the border, flowering through to the autumn. Hardy **Fuchsia** *Riccartonii* is also recommended and will tolerate exposed positions, it can reach a height of 8' and should be cut back hard in the spring. **Hydrangea** *Paniculata* 'Limelight' is remarkable for a shady position, it has to be cut back to the main stems in late spring. **Perovskia** 'Blue Sky' has blue spikes on silver stems and is very reliable especially on warm slopes.

Some interesting plug plants to order now for containers are *Antirrhium majus* with fantastic rich colours, *Petunia* 'Red Velour'. *Heliotrope arborecensis* 'Midnight' with a lovely honey scent, *Thunbergia* 'African Sunset' to plant with **white cosmos**, *Dianthus* 'Memories'. An evergreen for pots, *Pittisporum* 'Elaine Paterson' will always be my favourite.

For the boring tasks – replace container compost, feed shrubs and roses, check roses for aphids and rub them off and spray with fungicide. Clear problem weeds such as nettles and brambles, and keep weeds down in the beds with the hoe. Clean greenhouse glass. Dead head daffodils.




